2006 TO 2022

This year marks the milestone of the 20th winner of the Young Rural Ambassador Award, an award for youth that I envisaged would strengthen pathways, engagement and opportunities for 16–19 year-olds who had an interest in, and passion, for country shows and rural communities.

During my time as state and national Rural Ambassador winner in the early 2000's, I observed the age group with a potential to have more meaningful involvement with the show movement, were senior secondary students and those in their formative years in trades and tertiary education.

After some discussion and debate, in 2006 the first state final was held for the Young Rural Ambassador Youth Award to highlight the importance of youth in rural South Australia, particularly within the agricultural show movement and identify enthusiastic, skilful and industrious young people involved in their local community.

The goal was to create an award to compliment the existing Rural Ambassador Award for 20–30 year-olds, to enable the next generation to increase their participation at country shows and the Royal Adelaide Show, and develop as leaders and active volunteers in their chosen careers and communities. Early engagement was crucial for future succession planning and creating networking and learning experiences for youth.

Over the last 20 years there have been 161 Young Rural Ambassador Award state finalists, and 19 of these have gone on to compete as Rural Ambassador Award state finalists.

Enjoy reading the reflections of the past 19 state winners, and we acknowledge the support of sponsors and organisers, and the involvement of all participants in the program from across local show, association and state levels, and trust the award has helped shape their personal experiences and life journeys.

Winning the South Australian Young Rural Ambassador State Final in 2013 at just 16 years of age, and becoming the **youngest-ever recipient of the award**, was the beginning of an incredible journey. Since then, I completed Year 12 at Keith Area School before heading to northern South Australia, where I worked as a governess on two sheep and cattle stations.

I later relocated to Alice Springs to begin my career in agribusiness with Elders, before returning to South Australia in 2020. Shortly after relocating, my life took an unexpected turn when I was diagnosed with Hodgkin lymphoma. Following months of chemotherapy and radiation treatment, I am incredibly grateful to celebrate five years in remission this year—a milestone that reminds me never to take opportunities or good health for granted.

Back home, I rediscovered my passion for country shows and, inspired by the personal growth and opportunities the Young Rural Ambassador Program had given me, I entered the Rural Ambassador competition at the Naracoorte Show in 2022. I was fortunate to progress through the association and state finals, ultimately being named the South Australian Runner-up Rural Ambassador in 2023. That experience led to the opportunity of a lifetime—a study tour to Canada in 2025.

Throughout my journey, I have learnt to grab every opportunity that comes my way because you never know where it might lead.
